The "Baskin Haggadah"



<u>A Passover Haggadah</u>. This classic Reform Haggadah contains a complete Passover home service, an extensive song section, and supplemental readings and meditations, with beautiful illustrations by Leonard Baskin.

Children's Haggodot



<u>Sammy Spider's First Haggadah</u>. Sammy leads young children through the steps of the Passover seder, telling the story of the Exodus, asking and answering the Four Questions, and sampling the traditional foods. This book includes creative readings and songs, as well as colorful paper collage art and is recommended for children ages 4 to 6.



Family Haggadot



A Night of Questions. A unique four-in-one Reconstructionist Haggadah that includes outlines for customizing a Seder for the people present at the table. The four menus include a Seder for young children, a Seder for older children with adults, a Seder for groups of diverse backgrounds, and a Seder focusing on the role of women.



<u>A Family Haggadah II</u> (1997). A shortened version of the traditional Haggadah. It includes new commentaries and discussion questions from traditional contemporary sources.



<u>A Common Road to Freedom</u>. This Haggadah celebrates the commonality between redemption of ancient Israel from Egypt and the ongoing struggle for equality and civil rights among African Americans. It is easily reproduced for a home seder, or sections that apply to modern times can be added in to the Haggadah a family might already use.
