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# FROM THE PRESIDENT

magine this: you've been asked to have an aliyah at your niece's bat mitzvah at Temple Sinai. Since you're from out of town, you've never been to this temple and you can't wait to participate in her simcha. You drive your hand-operated van to the Military Road entrance, park in the designated spot, and use your van's ramp to get out onto the parking lot. The lot is a little confusing – where to go? – but you retrace the driveway you came in on, power up the hill, and you have arrived.

Once inside the sanctuary you see a cousin you haven't seen in several years. She invites you to sit with her and her family toward the front of the sanctuary. At this point you realize you can't really sit with her. The pews are fixed, there are no spaces or the ability to remove a seat for your wheelchair. You have to sit in the aisle. People walk around you as they walk up and down. It's difficult to participate in a conversation with your cousin because you have to lean around the wooden side of the aisle, so you settle in and look at the bimah.

The first thing you notice is that there is no ramp to the bimah, there's a lift on the side. You try not to think about it as the service starts. Your niece seems so mature. When did that happen? She leads prayers effortlessly. Finally the torah reading has begun and you are called up for the aliyah.

You move your chair over to the lift while someone runs over to operate it. The service stops as you slowly rise to the bimah. Everyone is staring at you. You should be used to this sort of thing by now but you can't help but feel embarrassed. Throughout the reading you try not to think about the fact that you are going to have to go through it all again to get back down to your seat. Well, not your seat, your spot in the aisle.

Our sanctuary fully complies with the obligations of the Americans with Disabilities Act, but fails to comply with our moral obligation to treat everyone who enters with dignity. We can do better, and we will. As we prepare for renovations to increase meeting spaces and adapt the spaces we have to our current needs,

we will also be increasing the inclusiveness of our space. We will be making our sanctuary truly accessible, and we will be adding genderneutral restrooms in addition to maintaining the male/female restrooms.

There are many ways each of us contributes to the congregation. Simply showing up and greeting another person is a building block of community. Volunteering enriches both the congregation and the volunteer. And donating funds allows us to become the Temple Sinai we should be.

Renovating the sanctuary to become more accessible will allow us to align our services with our values. It is one of the many ways our capital campaign will improve our community. This is an unusual moment in the life of our congregation, a pivot point. We can all be a part of it. If you haven't already contributed to the Campaign for Temple Sinai, please do so. As I begin my term, I could not be more excited to be temple president at this moment of transformation. I hope you are as excited to be a part of it.

# FROM THE RABBI

#### **BUILDING A MISHKAN**

e spend the weeks from Passover to Shavuot counting the Omer-each day marking the Jewish people's journey from redemption to revelation, from freedom to celebrating the *matan torah*, the giving of the Torah at Sinai. After Shavuot ends, we begin a different kind of counting. The counting of each sacred day of summer.

As D.C. turns muggy, we bask in the long, light days of the new season. As we begin to mark this transition, our cycle of Torah readings includes Parashat Naso- the longest portion of the year. It includes the Priestly Benediction, a blessing common to Jews and non-Jews alike. We recite these words at almost every special occasion, when we name a baby, when we bless a Bar or Bat Mitzvah, under the chuppah at a wedding.

"Thus you shall bless the people of Israel. Say to them: 'Y'varekh'cha Adonai v'yeesh'm'recha: Yaeir Adonai panav eileycha veechuneka: Yeesa Adonai panav eilaycha v'yasem l'cha shalom.

May God bless you and watch over you. May God cause God's light to shine on you and be gracious to you. May God lift up God's face to you and grant you peace." (Number 6:23-26)

As the seasons change, these words resonate.

# Y'varekh'cha Adonai v'yeesh'm'recha—May God bless you and watch over you.

In this verse, we pray for God's blessing and protection. We ask God to keep an eye out for us and protect us from harm. May God inspire us to wear our bicycle helmets, keep us safe in our cars on road trips, and keep the lightning and rain away when we're camping. We ask God to play that protective, parental role that can be a source of such comfort.

The sages suggest that when the priests lift up their hands and say the first words of

this blessing, they are actually praying that God bless us with material goods, with abundance. According to the rabbis: "may you have enough and a little bit extra." As contemporary sages Tom Haverford and Donna on Parks and Recreation would say, "Treat yo'self." Summer is the season of the splurge- the

extra treat: getting the fanciest ice cream cone, ignoring your to-do list and enjoying the day at the pool, that special dinner out, staying up too late and dancing at an outdoor concert. No matter your favorite splurge, this is a blessing that encourages us to live a little, and enjoy those extra special treats.

#### Yaeir Adonai panav eileycha veechuneka— May God cause God's light to shine on you and be gracious to you.

At Sinai, we often say "May God's light shine on you and through you." When we pray that God's light will shine on us, we are not just asking for some kind of Divine spotlight, we are praying that we will become vessels through which God's light is manifest in the world.

Summer is a time to enjoy the blessings and privileges of our lives, the abundance that we prayed for in the first part of the blessing. And, the second blessing reminds us to remember those who do not enjoy those same privileges and comforts.

As vessels of God's light it is incumbent upon us to reflect that light into the world. In that spirit, to do something to help others this summer. Maybe its time to Marie Kondo a closet and donate slightly worn clothes to A Wider Circle. Read your Sinai emails for updates on our





Early in 2019 we publicly launched our comprehensive campaign to fund these needs. Every member is being asked to pledge as they can toward the shared commitment of ensuring the long-term vitality of our congregation. Our goal is not only to secure essential financial resources to fund strategic priorities, but also to build upon the support and enthusiam demonstrated by the congregation when 600+ congregants provided direct feedback on our strategic plan, by encouraging broad congregational participation in and financial support of this meaningful initiative.

#### By the Numbers

- Over a dozen stakeholder groups ranging from the TSWRJ to the Temple Sinai Nursery School provided input on the concept drawings.
- 600+ congregants responded to a survey that provided input on campaign priorities; our goal is to build on this success to achieve full congregant participation in the campaign.
- 60% of the financial goal was reached during the "quiet phase" preceding the public launch.
- Hundreds of members attended 6 campaign launch events in February 2019.
- 28 campaign leaders and staff contacted all 1,200 member families through meetings in individual and small group settings, direct mail, and other follow-up activities.
- 48% of the capital campaign donors have designated a portion of their pledge for the Annual Fund.

# TIKKUN OLAM— SOCIAL ACTION @ SINAI

We have just wrapped up an incredibly busy year of Social Action. The temple year was bookended by an inspiring Shabbat service and dinner last June honoring the Poor People's Campaign and a joyous Social Action Recognition Shabbat on May 31 featuring a sermon by Rev. Frankie Grayton of the Edgewood Baptist Church. In between congregants engaged in actions supporting a wide range of causes and were treated to an array of social action oriented programs. Our Refugees, Asylum Seeker and Immigration Support Group continues helping refugee families and the temple is sponsoring an asylum seeker who fled the Congo. A delegation of nearly 30 congregants and clergy attended the Religious Action Center's Consultation on Conscience and that experience will help to inspire our future efforts. There will be more to do in the coming months and we hope even more people can join the extraordinary group of individuals engaged in our activities. # THE DEATH OF MY TEMPLE Michael Sussmann

ike me, many in our congregation "belong" to two temples: our beloved Temple Sinai in northwest DC, and the temple of our youth—where we attended services with our families, went to religious school, became a Bar or Bat Mitzvah, and perhaps learned a few Jewish songs. We may or may not still visit that temple, but it remains in our memories and our hearts.

At the age of 68, the reform synagogue of *my* youth—Temple Beth El of Closter, NJ—was laid to rest on June 14, 2019. After membership dropped over 50% and finances withered under a large mortgage, the building was bought by a Korean church; the house of so many rituals and gatherings—my 1977 bar mitzvah included—is no more. On Saturday, the congregation marched its Torahs six miles to another failing temple that will absorb the remnants of Beth-El and try to survive, and perhaps, someday, even grow.

Closter, NJ sits in Bergen County, which has a large Jewish population and a number of temples in the area that survived the decades and even thrived. So why did Temple Beth-El perish? Simply put, Temple Beth-El failed to understand changes in the Jewish community at large and adapt to its needs. (For example, even in 2019, Beth El's rabbi will not perform interfaith marriages.) Unwilling or unable to change, the temple made itself unappealing to potential new members. Couple that with poor financial decisions by a temple leadership unaware of its looming loss in membership revenue, and the patient succumbed.

And what of Temple Sinai—so young at 70? Are there similarities? Thankfully, no. As a member of Sinai's board, I see a temple led by professionals, and volunteer leaders with strong professional backgrounds, who understand how to run a non-profit, a business, and a community organization, all rolled into one. And as a temple member and parent of three religious school students, I see clergy deeply engaged with our children, our Jewish and secular communities, and the issues of the day. From September to May, you can't find an open meeting space on a weeknight; temple events, educational programming, community programs, and holiday services fill the building with energy and enthusiasm. It's perpetually springtime at our shul.

Loss provides opportunity for reflection and appreciation for what we have. As Temple Beth-El took its last breath this weekend, I feel especially grateful for the warmth and vitality at Temple Sinai. And I am comforted in knowing that my children always will be able to return here, regardless of any other Jewish community where they also may belong. Because of its dedicated clergy, vibrant congregation, and committed professional staff, Temple Sinai will thrive for generations to come.



The Priestly blessing concludes:

Yeesa Adonai panav eilaycha v'yasem l'cha shalom—May God lift up God's face to you and grant you peace.

The rabbis explain this final blessing as a sign of intimacy,

a symbol of the immanent, unique relationship between God and God's people. This final blessing of shalom, often translated as "peace" has the same root as the word shalem meaning "whole." Taken together, this last line of this sacred text is the blessing of holiness and wholeness, experiencing the wonder of the world in which we dwell, in the relationships with which we are blessed, and perhaps a sense of connection to something

greater than ourselves.

As we embark on this summer season- may God watch over you and protect you and your loved ones. May God's light shine on you and through you and through your actions, be reflected into the world. And may you be blessed with holiness, wholeness, and abundant peaceHave a wonderful summer!

New additions reflect current trends and temple priorities. In Beyond Chrismukkah: The Christian-Jewish interfaith family in the United States, author Samira K. Mehta argues that the emergence of multiculturalism helped generate new terms by which interfaith families are empowered to shape their religious practices.. Torah Queeries: Weekly Commentaries on the Hebrew Bible, by Gregg Drinkwater, unites the voices of lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, and straight-

allied writers, including some of the most central figures in contemporary American Judaism. Stories of forgotten or lesser known Jewish women in history also are of growing interest. In *Meet Me at the Well: The Girls and Women of the Bible*, authors Jane Yolen and Barbara Diamond Goldin masterfully introduce us to some of them, pairing eloquent profiles with stunning art.

#### New for Young Adult Readers

In the Neighborhood of True, by Susan Kaplan Carlton, tackles anti-Semitism and the tug of assimilation. After her father's death, Ruth Robb and her family transplant themselves in the summer of 1958 from New York City to Atlanta—the land of debutantes, sweet tea, and the Ku Klux Klan. In her new hometown, Ruth quickly figures out she can be Jewish or she can be popular, but she can't be both. You can browse our entire of YA books in the fiction aisle.

#### Memoirs and Fiction

A few other new additions to our collection may just tempt you. Savage Feast: Three Generations, Two Continents, and a Dinner Table: A Memoir, by Boris Fishman is a gorgeously told, recipe-filled memoir of immigration, love, and an epic meal. In Strangers and Cousins: A Novel, by Leah Hager Cohen,

Bennie and Walter face conflict in their small town when a group of Haredi move there. In The Flight Portfolio: A Novel, by Julie Orringer, the acclaimed author of The Invisible Bridge, is a gripping historical novel based on the true story of American diplomat Varian Fry's extraordinary attempt to save the work, and the lives, of Jewish artists fleeing the Holocaust.
