FROM

THE SENIOR RABBI

Early in my rabbinic career, a student gave me a desk ornament that was a mini door set in its frame so that it could swing open or closed in either direction. On the front of the door it read, "Whenever God closes one door, He opens another." It was a sweet gesture but, for theological reasons, I tucked it into a drawer never to be displayed. I never wanted to endorse the idea that life's disappointments - the metaphorical closed doors - are God's way of showing us

Perhaps, however, I was too hasty in my dismissal of doors simultaneously opening and closing. As we bring this temple year to a close and prepare to open a new

life's true path. I don't believe Judaism exists to push us towards gratitude in the

face of loss or to convince us that trauma is a sign of God's love.

one, I see that closings and openings often come together. I still do not believe that suffering and loss are gifts to be embraced. But it is true that most endings also precipitate new beginnings. This idea is conveyed in the *Ne'ilah* prayers that end Yom Kippur. As we imagine the heavenly gates of *teshuva* closing, we implore God:



Open for us the gate at the time of the closing of the gate!

We are far from Yom Kippur, but this message resonates through May and June at Temple Sinai. We thank Cantor Laura Croen for her 29 years of service and wish her well in her retirement as we welcome Cantor Rachel Rhodes and open our hearts and our doors to her. We mark a transition among our board leaders, in particular our president. We thank Marcie Solomon for her years of service through some great challenges and accomplishments and we welcome and celebrate our new president, Ken Jaffe, who has been an important leader in many capacities over the past years.

The rise of our new building addition and outdoor spaces is the most visible opening of the coming months. We anticipate the building's completion this fall and accordingly we are closing the "Honor Our Heritage, Build Our Future" fundraising campaign. This is truly a moment of gates closing while we call simultaneously for new openings. The end of the fundraising campaign calls for a renewed effort to engage as many member of the community as possible. Like the Israelites building the ancient tabernacle, we seek the holy blessings that settle on everyone when each individual participates in building God's house. I hope you will join me in increasing your support if you've already given or making a first contribution if you haven't. I also invite you to join me in opening our hearts and our mouths to share our gratitude with Andrew Engel and Naomi Camper, co-chairs of the campaign, for their tireless work over the past five years. We open the gates of our new building, close the gates on our fundraising campaign, and start a new era for Temple Sinai.

What an amazing year it's been: honoring and celebrating the past, emerging quite well from a once-in-a-century pandemic, and designing the future! The year that has just concluded may well be considered Temple Sinai's most consequential single year since the 1950's when the congregation was established.

Most prominent and far-reaching of the many significant decisions that were made was the congregation and Rabbi Roos committing to a long-term extension of his service as Senior Rabbi. This profound commitment will provide important continuity, stability and strength, particularly as we are also transitioning from 29 years of a musical world led by Cantor Croen to the next one to be developed under the leadership of incoming Senior Cantor Rachel Rhodes.



The people of Temple Sinai have been able to clearly define and express who they are, what is important to them, and how to move into the future with intentional actions based on mission, values and a history of stability and long-term service. This year, an impressive number of engaged, invested members came forth to offer important guidance not only to the Cantor Search Committee, but also for the Art & Design Committee, the Membership Growth Task Force, the Committee for Israel Engagement and Social Justice, the Strategic Planning Committee, the various clergy and senior staff review committees, etc. So many people seeking a deeper involvement with the temple.

It's been a little more than one year since the temple "pivoted" from a mask mandate to a mask-optional policy. That shift in mid-March 2022 ushered in a new level of relaxation and the slow resumption of actually enjoying in-person gathering. (Slow, as in the board itself didn't hold its first in-person meeting until June.) But committees and affiliates eagerly re-committed to providing timely, interesting, compelling programs, and they also impressively connected with one another and have been able to identify opportunities for partnership and co-sponsorship of specific programs. I have often been struck by how, as large and diverse a community as Temple Sinai is, we are fundamentally "one." The mission and goals and objectives of the whole inform and are in turn strengthened by our many highly engaged sub-groups.

Lastly, I would like to thank the temple community for the honor and privilege of serving as your president these past two years. It has been immensely interesting, rewarding, and challenging to be at the crossroads of so much powerful community building and transformation. I believe that the actions of this past year will well-position our community for many years to come.

COMMITTEES & AFFILIATES

Temple Sinai's Core Values are the heart of our Strategic Plan. These Core Values guide the actions and activities of our congregation, including those of our many committees. Through these committees, our members during this past year have found a sense of belonging in meaningful Jewish communities, pursued social justice, engaged in intellectually stimulating Jewish learning experiences, and helped to thoughtfully steward the temple's resources, all of which reflect our Core Values.

ADMINISTRATION COMMITTEE

The Administration Committee continues to work with the Executive Director to oversee the temple's financial, technology, office, and human relations operations. Consistent with Temple Sinai's Core Value of **thoughtful stewardship of our resources**, we are particularly focused on making sure that the temple's employees are treated well and fairly.

DAYTIMERS COMMITTEE

The DayTimers Committee conducted fourteen programs from May 2022 through May 2023. Two programs have been in person at Temple Sinai, and the remainder were on Zoom. The programs usually are on the second Monday of the month and open to anyone available at our 1:00 PM start time. Subjects this year included U.S. political issues, Israel, Jewish culture and history, social action, and other timely and relevant subjects. In planning programs, we are aware of the Core Value of Temple Sinai to be an intellectually stimulating place and provide meaningful adult education, and our programs are designed to fall within those objectives. Our excellent speakers, both congregants and others, have presented to audiences from 60 to over 100 people. The audience includes Temple Sinai members, former members, and guests. We have an active DayTimers Committee of eight members who contribute to the recruitment of speakers and the success of our programs.

Here are a few of our speakers from the past year:

Sen. Tom Harkin, former Senator from Iowa; Cantor Laura Croen and three other local cantors; Debra Caplan on the topic of Yiddish theater; Marcia Coyle on Supreme Court issues; Marvin Kalb, distinguished journalist and author; Rep. Jamie Raskin, Maryland 8th District; Mark Oppenheimer on anti-Semitism in the Ivy League; Phyllis Fagell, author, journalist, and child counselor; Barak Ravid and Joel Rubin on Israel politics; Robert Aubry Davis and Jane Horwitz on the local cultural scene; and Ken Jaffe for an update on renovations and expansion project here at Temple Sinai.

Our programs this past year have helped the Temple Sinai maintain contact with the members of the congregation. We have received numerous comments about the important role DayTimers programs have played in keeping congregants in touch with others as well as keeping them informed. During the next year we plan to have more programs at Temple Sinai and we will continue to maintain our Zoom options.

THE COMMITTEE FOR ISRAEL ENGAGEMENT & SOCIAL JUSTICE

The Committee for Israel Engagement and Social Justice (CIESJ) was established in December 2022. A Mission Statement, which was approved by the Temple Sinai Board in February 2023, marks our commitment to Israel as a historic and cultural home of the Jewish people while also defending Israel's foundational principles as a pluralistic democracy that recognizes the rights of women and minority communities, guarantees religious freedom, and demands the end to the oppression inherent in the occupation of Palestinian territories under Israeli rule. The committee combines Temple Sinai's Core Values of celebrating our Jewish heritage as well as its commitment to tikkun olam. We believe that liberal democracy is a Jewish value.

The current Israeli government represents an existential threat to Israel's liberal democracy. CIESJ's work has focused on providing educational programs for the congregation about conditions in Israel, expanding our network to other congregations in the DC metropolitan region, and partnering with URJ/ARZA and other national organizations that are working toward our common goals. CIESJ has had three educational programs this past year, including speakers on settler violence, Palestinian nonviolent peace activism, and a Yom Ha'Atzmaut Shabbat presentation by Jeremy Ben-Ami, founder and president of J Street. CIESJ and other congregants have participated in several protests against the current Israeli government's efforts to undermine its judicial system. In addition, CIESJ is using some of its Dollars for Israel funds to support civil society organizations in the U.S. and Israel who are defending our Jewish values and Israel's Jewish heritage.





The CIESJ demonstrated for Israel's democracy with the Progressive Israel Network and the UnXeptable group of Israeli expats at the Israeli Embassy and the Grand Hyatt Hotel in DC on February 3, March 12, and March 26, 2023. Sinai participants included committee members, other Sinai members, and Rabbis Roos, Diamondstein, and Reiner.

THE TEMPLE SINAI LIBRARY

In all of its endeavors the Temple Sinai Library seeks to amplify the Core Values articulated in the temple's strategic plan. In particular, our collection and activities align with the temple's values of **providing Jewish education** that has a meaningful impact on its participants from early childhood through adult education as well as contributing to the temple being a **vibrant**, **joyful**, and **spiritually and intellectually stimulating place**. We support these values while also providing a welcoming environment attuned to the specific needs and interests of our multiracial congregation.

One dad described our Tot Shabbat story time as a "zen hour in the weekend." It's also a forum where we share books featuring diverse families and individuals as well as Jewish holidays and principles with our youngest readers and their adults.

A mother asked us to prepare a book bundle to help her "share/learn a little more about each holiday" with

her sons who "are the only non-Modern Orthodox family of all [her] inlaws." And a grandmother shared that her grandson "has been so pleased with the book he received at the Tot Shabbat...he wants to read it every day."

In addition to the book giveaways, Tot Shabbat Story Times, and book bundles, we connect with adult readers through our five annual SinaiReads book discussions. Led by Rabbi Goldstein, we tackle fiction

ranging from new releases such as *Let There Be Light* by Liana Finck to *The Passenger* by Ulrich Boschwitz, which was written in 1938.

We share information through our monthly Circle of Book Lovers email, which is chock full of in-person and virtual literary opportunities; the short reviews of newly purchased books found in the quarterly email Check It Out!; and the book blurbs tied to holidays and events in the temple's weekly email.

We support the clergy and staff with a special edition of Check it Out! with reviews of books of special interest to them, offer research assistance to members, and collaborate with other temple committees.

This year, we worked with the Archives and Music committees to record an oral history of Cantor Croen, who is retiring after nearly three decades at Temple Sinai (see more on page 9). In it, she shares her journey to becoming a cantor and reflects on her experiences at Temple Sinai. Watch the full video here: templesinaidc.org/oral-history-project.

We also partnered with the Archives committee to create a Finding Aid to increase access to these resources about the temple's rich history.



Purim and Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion displays

The library committee is an engaged group of volunteers. We tackle individual and collective library projects as well as supporting each other and celebrating our life events.

MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE

The Temple Sinai Membership Committee continues to **foster a sense of belonging** for new members, one of our Core Values. Over the past year, we welcomed 42 new member households to our community; 32 of these families have young children. Each new member received a welcome bag at their home, complete with Temple Sinai swag, a home-baked treat, challah, grape juice, and wine for Shabbat along with a pot of seeds for flowers. All new member families were also invited to receptions throughout the year to meet our clergy team and other temple members.

This year, we fostered new connections with our college-aged members and their parents. At Chanukah, we sent gelt, dreidels, and a Starbucks gift card to 75 college students. On a Monday night in February, over 50 parents with college-aged children gathered at a member's home for an evening of food, drinks, and conversation. The parents brought baked goods and other treats and made care packages to mail to their kids. These parents are looking forward to gathering again and forming new connections with temple members who are at a similar stage in life. We welcome any Temple Sinai members who would like to join our efforts to welcome new members into our community and help them find meaningful connection.

Honoring Senior Cantor Laura Croen in her Retirement Year

The Music Committee's year began with the news that Laura Croen, our beloved Senior Cantor of more than 29 years, would be retiring at the end of June, 2023. The Search Committee, which included Music Committee Co-Chairs Stephanie Lebow and Myra Weinberg, spent a number of months in an intense search for a new cantor to fill the large void that would be left by Cantor Croen's retirement. We were all thrilled to have Rachel Rhodes, currently the Cantor at Temple Rodef Shalom in Falls Church, Virginia, accept the Senior Cantor position. She will be starting in July of this year.

The Choir

The Music Committee produced a number of events specifically oriented toward celebrating Cantor Croen. This year's Shabbat Shira, attended by more than 250 people on February 24, 2023, was entitled "P'tach Libi (Open My Heart): Music, the Gateway to the Soul." The joyful service featured pianist, conductor and educator Joyce Rosenzweig, who was an early mentor of Cantor Croen. Leading the Temple Sinai Choir in a number of contemporary and folk melodies, Rosenzweig also spoke about the changes taking place in the cantorate and how they are influencing services today and into the future.

On March 19, 2023, there was a sold-out concert by acclaimed a cappella group Six13, with Cantor Croen joining in on one of their numbers. On April 29, we celebrated with Cantor Croen in a joyous Dance and Schmooze party featuring reminiscences, a skit by the clergy, a special "Laura cocktail" and delicious food. A DJ helped hundreds of temple members dance the night away!

Still to come is Cantor Croen's Farewell Shabbat service on June 2, 2023. It will feature remarks by clergy past and present, as well as singing by the Adult and Youth choirs and instrumentals by house band Middle Matzah Conspiracy. Cantor Croen will choose the music that has been most meaningful to her over the years, and it promises to be a special evening.

SINAICARES

SinaiCares continued its mission of fulfilling Temple Sinai's Core Value of providing member-to-member support at times of need and celebration. We have a roster of fifteen volunteers who deliver challahs, yahrzeit candles and baby baskets to members who are mourning a loss or celebrating a new baby. We made sure to call our most isolated members regularly throughout the year, and especially around the High Holidays. ShulCloud, our new member database, along with our existing pastoral tracking system, has allowed us to enhance our individualized outreach for our members who need extra support.

TEMPLE SINAI MEN OF REFORM JUDAISM

The Temple Sinai Men of Reform Judaism (TSMRJ or the Brotherhood) exemplifies Temple Sinai's Core Value of **creating community** by offering adult male members of Temple Sinai a sense of community and fellowship. Most of our programs are social, and we are also involved in service, charity, and the religious and cultural life of Temple Sinai. And we welcome everyone from the congregation, not just men (although usually just the adults), to enjoy our events that appeal to them.

- For 2022-2023, we attempted to return to a full year of programming, and we started the year in fine fashion. In October 2022, Alex Laufer, co-founder, and Head Distiller for One Eight Distilling (now District Made) from DC's Ivy City showed off some of his local whiskeys and gins at our annual tasting in the Sukkah.
- Early In 2023, we hosted a book presentation by Robert K. Sutton, former Chief Historian for the National Park Service (2007-2016). He talked about his latest book, *Nazis on the Potomac: The Top- Secret Intelligence Operation That Helped Win WWII*, about German POWs stationed at Fort Hunt, Virginia, and the intelligence training facility at Fort Ritchie in Maryland where Jewish German refugees were taught to spy for the United States.
- In March, the Brotherhood again served as bartenders at the Adult Purim Celebration, keeping everyone there in high spirits.
- In March, we hosted a Trivia Night in the Bet Am, where temple members (mostly) competed in teams to answer trivia questions on a variety of topics. We all knew which US President was the architect for the University of Virginia, but no one knew the recording artist covering Lean On Me.
- In April, shortly after Passover, the Brotherhood hosted a Comedy Club, where a number of temple members showed off their comedy skills to the audience, who also enjoyed food and drink, all to benefit Sinai House.
- In early June, we are planning an outing to Top Golf, where we can enjoy a sports-themed entertainment venue set out like a golf driving range, with climate-controlled, weather-protected hitting bays for 6 people. We hope members of the Sisterhood will join us for this event.
- The Brotherhood also showed its support for the temple by supporting the Capital Campaign and partnering with the Sisterhood to sponsors kiddush cups for B'nei Mitzvot and the Yom Kippur Break Fast. We plan again this year to serve as a sponsor of the Tricia Davis 5K for Sinai House at Rock Creek Park on Mother's Day. We also contribute the cornstalks used to decorate the Sukkah for Sukkot.

TEMPLE SINAI WOMEN OF REFORM JUDAISM

The Temple Sinai Women of Reform Judaism (TSWRJ) offered a full calendar of opportunities in 2022-2023 to get together, learn, pray, eat, give back, and even hike. Many thanks to TSWRJ Board Presidents Ellen Croog and Audrey Kramer for their leadership, to our program coordinators, and to the many volunteers. Here are some highlights from this year:

- Capital Area Food Bank fundraiser. Temple Sinai responded generously to TSWRJ's annual call for donations at the High Holidays, raising \$30,000 to help the food bank provide healthy meals to people in the Washington metro region.
- Chanukah Mart, November 2022. In-person once again! Congregants enjoyed schmoozing, shopping, and noshing on familiar foods such as latkes, sufganiyot, kugel and stuffed cabbage.
- Shabbaton, January 2023. More than 60 Temple Sinai women came to the temple for a day related to the theme "Women of the Bible – Rebels with a Cause." Rabbi Goldstein and Cantor Croen led us in a meaningful service. Activities also included lively facilitated discussions, a tzedakah project, and, of course, lunch.
- Authors' Roundtable, March 2023. More than four dozen congregants and friends came to the Bet Am for a panel of three noted local authors: Curdella Forbes, Liz Scheier, and Martha Anne Toll. TSWRJ's Fran Rothstein moderated.
- Second Seder, April 6, 2023.
- Sisterhood Shabbat service, April 21, 2023.

The year began with the fall welcome meeting for all TSWRJ members and concluded with our annual spring membership meeting (May 17). Other activities were tours of the Holocaust Museum, the Capital Area Food Bank, and a private home to see a collection of Indian art. There was a play reading and a book discussion (Nina Totenberg's book, *Dinners With Ruth*). We co-sponsored a brunch and discussion on May 7, "Intertwined Narratives: Black-Jewish Relationships in America," with the WRJ of Temple Emanuel in nearby Kensington, Maryland.

Mahjong ("Mahj") players meet weekly on Wednesday evenings and Liz Brenner-Leifer leads hikes once a month on Sundays in Rock Creek Park. The doors of the TSWRJ Judaica shop are open (or can be open by appointment), and we are available to help with your

THE TEMPLE SINAI NURSERY SCHOOL


It has been another joyful year of growth and learning at Temple Sinai Nursery School – the 30th year of our program! The children continue to flourish under the care of our remarkable faculty, who nurture the children's sense of wonder through developmentally appropriate play-based experiences. As our children work with clay, paint, manipulatives, blocks, beads, natural materials, and more, their curiosity propels learning. Through storytelling, imaginative play, building, climbing, experimenting, planting, cooking, and sharing ideas with one another, TSNS children build lasting relationships, resilience, confidence, and a strong sense of identity.

This year we were thrilled to welcome children to the Outdoor Classroom, the newest learning space at TSNS. Situated between the Bet Am and

upstairs classroom wing, the Outdoor Classroom was designed to delight and engage our young learners and has become a favorite destination for exploration in our TSNS community. The ongoing construction at the temple has also been fascinating for the children, who have

enjoyed carefully observing the building process through windows in the construction fence and designing their own projects in the Digging Square added to the playground this year.

Weekly Shabbat Sing celebrations, monthly Family Shabbats, and holiday celebrations like our Chanukah Party, Purim Parades, and Passover




Out provided additional opportunities to come together as a community, with some friendly competition between classes adding a little extra excitement.

Some highlights included the B'har Sinai youth music ensemble, directed by Neil Weston and Cantor Laura Croen, and an exploration of Jewish artists and the creation of artwork in their image.
- Tot Shabbat and holiday programming brought so many children and their families to our play spaces for fun. We were so proud to augment our Tot Shabbat experience with a monthly Tot Storytime in our library with librarian Ruth Polk.
- 10. Most of all, 2022-2023 brought back a year of uninterrupted, in-person, joyful learning experiences to TSRS and we couldn't be happier to be back together.

In June 2022 we celebrated the groundbreaking of the Renovation & Expansion project's South Addition construction. Over the past year we have seen the space change dramatically–first with demolition of the existing space, then with the excavation and foundation work, and now with the structure of the new addition rapidly rising and taking shape. Financial Overview

This campaign started in 2018 with the goal of raising a minimum of \$8 million to renovate the sanctuary, expand the building, and create a \$2 million sustaining fund to help our community thrive. While we have exceeded that initial goal and have raised close to \$11 million as this report went to print, inflation and the necessary phasing of the project because of the pandemic have raised overall total campaign costs to \$14–15 million. We are confident that our congregation has the capacity to achieve this final goal.

While the temple has a plan to finance the gap between the amount currently raised and the overall costs of the project, we will be working hard between now and the end of the year to reach the final goal so that we can minimize the amount that must be financed. You can help us close this gap and reduce the temple's financing burden.

As part of the Renovation & Expansion project, we have already reshaped the temple's playground, which is integral to the child-centered educational programming that is the foundation of our Nursery and Religious Schools. The space now extends into a beautiful wooded glen, adding more area than was lost to the South Addition; a new outdoor classroom space next to the Bet Am was also developed as part of the temple's commitment to bringing vibrant and engaging learning experiences outside.

With the Just Play More campaign, we will continue to modernize and refresh the playground, which is enjoyed by children and families throughout the Temple Sinai community. The playground also plays a significant role in the curriculum of the Nursery School. We believe that play is the primary vehicle through which learning progresses in the early years and the playground is an integral space for this learning to occur. In this expansive outdoor space, children engage in their own, self-chosen, thrilling play, during which they can take risks, build resilience, deepen friendships, and strengthen growing bodies. Now, as the Nursery School celebrates its 30th Anniversary, the playground will benefit from this exciting reimagining, bringing new and intriguing opportunities to explore, climb, slide, and play to the children of our Temple Sinai community.

The launching of this campaign, which includes significant new additions to this space, will support play that is more challenging, more engaging, more exciting, more varied, more creative, more collaborative, and more dynamic. Campaign Summary

As of this printing, thanks to the generosity of the Temple Sinai community, almost \$11 million has been pledged to the Honor our Heritage, Build our Future Campaign. Overall, we've received donations from 540 different donors and 486 current temple families, which is about 42% of our congregation.

The vast majority of donations to this campaign have come in the form of multi-year pledges—often paid over 5 years. For many, these are the largest charitable commitments they or their family have ever made, and we are happy to work with donors to spread their gifts out over multiple years.

Since we re-launched the campaign in 2022 following the pause brought upon by the Covid pandemic, we had received almost \$1 million in new pledges and gifts from 69 donors. Many of these are from current donors who have generously extended their pledges, as well as from new donors joining the campaign for the first time.

THE DAVIS CENTER FOR SOCIAL JUSTICE

Temple Sinai's social justice work is thriving under the umbrella of the Davis Center for Social Justice. Our many programs have provided insights and unique perspectives on a wide variety of topics including reproductive rights, environmental justice, the arrival of migrants to our area, and more. This past year, we hosted two inspiring Shabbat programs: one on gun violence prevention with Steve Dettelbach, Director of the Federal Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms, and Explosives, and another featuring Mini Timmaraju, President of NARAL. These services directly connect our Jewish identity with our deep-seated roots as a congregation committed to tikkun olam. We also launched our monthly newsletter and blog as a way to keep the entire community informed of our wide range of social justice activities.

The Davis Center continues to support refugees through our sponsorship of the Noori family; we have also provided financial support to organizations working directly with the increasing number of vulnerable migrants arriving in our area. Our Davis Center Youth Board has been involved in raising funds for the Capital Area Food Bank and working with our Green Team to enhance our building grounds. We hosted an event with over 60 temple clergy, leaders and members on activating racial equity to affirm our commitment to being an antiracist congregation. Our Green Team has been hard at work planting new trees and a pollinator garden. WIN's ongoing work with our interfaith partners involves affordable housing, climate change and more. And we have continued to engage over 300 congregants in our postcard writing efforts to increase voter turnout through our Get Out The Vote campaigns.

These programs are just a sampling of the work the Davis Center has engaged in during the past year, pursuing our Core Value of Olam. We continue to organize and voice our concerns on a wide range of social justice issues. Read on for more about the great work of our various initiatives below.

GET OUT THE VOTE (GOTV)

Over 150 Temple Sinai teens and adults came together in 2022 to ensure that eligible voters around the country were registered to vote and had the ability to have their voices heard. Temple Sinai continued to join with the Religious Action Center of Reform Judaism and Reclaim Our Vote in this effort. Congregants wrote postcards, made phone calls, and sent texts to ensure that people knew where and how to register to vote and when and where to vote. These efforts continue with state elections in 2023 as we gear up for the presidential election in 2024.

THE GREEN TEAM



The Temple Sinai Green Team, co-chaired by Sarah Barr Engel and Liz Feldman, has been actively engaged in actions that reflect Jewish values by advancing the environmental sustainability of Temple Sinai's building and grounds, by supporting climate legislation at the local, state and federal levels, and by promoting best practices for congregation members to take to increase their own sustainability.

Siddiqi test the stove in TS kitchen for nitrogen dioxide Activities in the fall of 2022 included organizing a wildflower planting activity at Temple Sinai Religious School's back-to-school

event, collecting recycling and compost at the WRJ Chanukah Mart, planting native trees on the Temple Sinai grounds, and preparing soil for a pollinator garden to be planted in the spring. Temple Sinai also joined the Jewish Climate Leadership Coalition, a network of Jewish community organizations who recognize the existential threat and moral urgency of climate change and commit to taking action.

In early 2023, the Green Team co-hosted the Zwerdling Program on environmental justice, "Environmental Injustice: What Is It and What Can We Do About It." Other activities in 2023 include developing a Temple Sinai Climate Action Plan with support from the Jewish Climate Leadership Coalition, planting the pollinator garden, and promoting climate legislation under consideration by Maryland General Assembly, Montgomery County, and the DC Government and City Council.

GUN VIOLENCE PREVENTION GROUP

Despite the lingering pandemic, the Temple Sinai Gun Violence Prevention Group (GVP) remained very active and engaged during the past year. Highlights included:

- Webinars with state officials and GVP advocates about the contents and status of gun safety bills in Maryland and Virginia and breaking the cycle of gun violence through community intervention.
- A Gun Violence Interfaith Shabbat Service on December 9, 2022 featured guest speaker Steven Dettelbach, Director of the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms, and Explosives. The service also marked the 10th anniversary of the Sandy Hook Elementary School gun massacre and the fourth anniversary of the Tree of Life Synagogue shooting in Pittsburgh. We were honored to be joined by Tony Harris, a former security guard at Temple Sinai, who was seriously wounded during an assault rifle attack in D.C. at the Edmund Burke School in April 2022.

• The release of a free, 120-page digital "toolkit" published by the

Interfaith GVP Network to engage more houses of worship on GVP. The toolkit, entitled *Turning Faith Into Action: An Interfaith Toolkit to Engage the Faith Community on Gun* Violence Prevention, is the most comprehensive "how-to-do-it" manual for congregations to engage on GVP to be published in many years.

MULTIRACIAL SINAI

Throughout the past year, the temple's Multiracial Sinai Committee (MRS) strove to broaden and deepen our congregation's Core Values of **belonging** for all who participate in our synagogue, celebrating our inclusive and diverse community, and working towards our goal of being a multiracial and antiracist congregation.

ANNUAL REPORT

In May 2022, MRS and Temple Sinai hosted Ilana Kaufman, Executive Director, Jews of Color Initiative, to present *Beyond the Count: Perspectives and Lived Experiences of Jews of Color.* More than 75 attendees from synagogues in the DMV participated in a discussion by a panel of Temple Sinai Jews of Color elaborating on their own experiences. Jews of Color from across the DMV gathered before the presentation for an informal dinner of sharing, dialogue and fellowship. The program highlighted the racial and ethnic diversity of American Jews and the work we need to do to repair systems of inequality in our own Jewish community.

Within Temple Sinai, the MRS Racial Equity Project (REP) continued its efforts to bring a racial equity lens to our congregational life. A notable example, with ongoing dialogue between REP and the Renovation and Expansion Committee, minority-owned businesses were encouraged to participate in all stages of the contracting process for the ongoing major construction on our site. REP worked with many other committees to look for opportunities to contribute to the dismantling of racist patterns and structures. This work is ongoing.

In December, more than 60 Temple Sinai board members, committee chairs, active MRS volunteers, clergy, and senior staff convened in an all-day interactive working session to build collaboratively our future as an antiracist synagogue. In the year ahead, MRS will seek to build on the energy generated by the working session to help define and implement actionable priorities across the congregation. The new committee cochairs will seek to emulate the achievements of our founding co-chairs, Deitra Reiser and Cathy Goldwyn.

MRS continues to offer the 6-week Building Racial Stamina (BRS) class, facilitated by congregants. These guided discussions, in which over 130 congregants have already participated, aim to raise self-awareness of race, and awareness of the impact of race in our communities; to affirm and embrace the belonging of all people at Temple Sinai; and to develop racial stamina – the ability to engage in conversations and work that further racial justice. We also continue to sponsor an affinity group in which congregants of color can get to know each other and share their experiences in our temple.

REFUGEE, ASYLUM AND MIGRANT SUPPORT

It has been a busy year for this program. As sponsors for the Noori family, Temple Sinai volunteers have worked hard to move the family towards independence. In particular, we have provided significant professional assistance to Noori to aid his search for adequate employment and have devoted considerable efforts to ensuring the four children experience success at school. We have extended our rent support at the house the Nooris currently occupy until the end of the school year in order to enable Noori to secure better employment and to avoid disrupting the children's studies.

On other fronts, we have provided financial assistance to refugee support non-profits such as Women for Afghan Women, and fellow faith organizations, including St. Columba's and St. John's Norwood. A Temple Sinai member actually provided housing for a family sponsored by St. Columba's. We assisted the wife of one of our long-term refugee friends, Khan Mohammad, to safely exit Afghanistan, and she recently gave birth to the couple's first child. We have also provided significant assistance to Khan's brother Raz and his family, who recently arrived in the US.

We are happy to report that Blondy Mayele, an asylum seeker from Congo whom we have assisted for more than four years, was successful in obtaining asylum, and that his fiancée recently gave birth to their first child.

Temple Sinai has provided financial support to organizations working directly with individuals who, after crossing the southern border, have been transported to the DMV. In consultation with these organizations, we are charting a path that will enable the synagogue to aid in their relief and advocate to increase government support.

Temple Sinai members have been incredibly generous with their contributions and volunteer time, making all these efforts possible.

REPRODUCTIVE HEALTH AND RIGHTS GROUP

Temple Sinai's Reproductive Health and Rights Group is actively fighting for reproductive rights and abortion access through our fundraising efforts, educational programming, and advocacy. Thank you to our active group of volunteers who help carry out our mission.

Before the devastating Dobbs decision was handed down in June 2022, we started researching organizations for an ongoing fundraising campaign benefitting three organizations that work on legal support, direct support and abortion access for people across the country: Baltimore Abortion Fund, NCJW's Jewish Fund for Abortion Access, and If/When/How: Lawyering for Reproductive Justice. (Learn more at the Davis Center website.)

Our Google newsletter keeps our membership informed of programs, protests, educational, advocacy, and volunteer opportunities, as well as snippets of important news. We catalyzed our members to take action by writing postcards, making phone calls and texting (mostly through Reclaim Our Vote) to get out the vote in the November 2022 general elections, in the elections where abortion was on the ballot in Michigan and Kentucky, and in the April 2023 special Wisconsin Supreme Court primary and election.

Educational and Fundraising Events:

- Our Zoom program in August 2022 featured representatives from the three organizations in our fundraising campaign for the entire congregation to learn more about the critical importance of their work.
- We brainstormed next steps with Rabbi Goldstein in October 2022 where many members stepped up to participate in and chair our subcommittees to help do the work of our group, including volunteer opportunities, educational programs and speakers, and Repro Shabbat.
- Our guest speaker for Repro Shabbat, held in January 2023, was Mini Timmaraju, President of NARAL Pro-Choice America.
- Our program on "The Janes" featuring Heather Booth, one of the founders of the Janes, was also held in January. Both Mini Timmaraju and Heather Booth inspired us to continue to take action.
- A March 2023 program just for teens, Pizza and a Conversation for Teens: Reproductive Rights and Abortion, featured our own Dr. Sara Imershein.

WASHINGTON INTERFAITH NETWORK (WIN)

As a multi-racial, multi-faith citywide organization, WIN is working on multiple campaigns to make the District of Columbia a more equitable and just community. This past year, Temple Sinai cemented its leadership in WIN citywide as Rabbi Hannah Goldstein joined its strategy team and Barbara Kraft became part of its newly created board of directors.

In Upper Northwest, Temple Sinai members are leading the WIN Ward 3 Affordable Housing Group, organizing for development of affordable housing at sites including the Chevy Chase Civic Core (anticipating construction of a new public library and community center on Connecticut Avenue) and the Western Bus Garage. Key partners include Adas Israel, Chevy Chase Presbyterian, National United Methodist, and St. Columba's. We have also collaborated with high school students at Jackson-Reed and Georgetown Day School to canvass and educate neighborhood residents about the history of deliberate racial segregation in Ward 3.

Other WIN initiatives include:

- Black homeownership: The Black Equity through Home Ownership (BETH) effort is focusing on increasing rates of new home ownership among Black residents of DC as well as providing resources for maintenance and property tax relief to ensure that longtime owners can remain in their homes.
- Addressing climate change: WIN is documenting dangerous methane gas leaks at the street level as well as measuring emissions in homes, particularly in public housing units. With new federal dollars available for clean energy, WIN is working to ensure that those funds are used to retrofit apartments and houses with electric appliances and wean DC residents off gas.
- Public safety: WIN is focused on evidence-based solutions to gun violence, promoting actions such as increasing the number of "violence interrupters," dispatching mental health professionals rather than police when 911 calls indicate someone is in crisis, and providing culturally competent behavioral health services, particularly for young people.

In the lead up to 2022 DC Council elections, WIN convened hundreds of residents to ask candidates to make commitments to act on specific campaign items.

We continue to look for additional members of the congregation who are looking for opportunities to participate in anti-racist action, interfaith dialogue and relationship building, and *tikkun olam*.

SINAI **HOUSE**

In 1992, Temple Sinai members, inspired by the spirit of *tikkun olam*, and seeking to make a significant contribution to the local community, founded Sinai House, to enable unhoused families to transition to independence by providing safe and affordable housing, comprehensive social services, and financial support. As we have for the last 30 years, Sinai House continued that endeavor in the past year, serving four families in residence at Sinai House and three families in our new post-residency program.

Our annual Homes & Hearts Shabbat Service, held on Friday, November 11, 2022 (1st photo), was an extra special 30th anniversary celebration. Current and former Sinai House staff, residents, board members, volunteers and Temple Sinai clergy submitted video reflections. Rabbi Noah Diamondstein edited the video, lending music from his recently released album, "My Whole Heart." After the service, attendees listened to live music while enjoying food celebrating the countries of origin of some of our alumni.

We are proud to report that in 2022 we surpassed the record amount we raised in 2021! 


Where does money for temple programs and operations come from?



Why does Temple Sinai need financial support beyond Membership Commitments?

Membership Commitments are the largest and most important source of funds to support temple activities, representing 46% of operating revenues in 2021-22. Generous additional contributions from members constitute another 6% of revenues. In 2021-22, government relief funds helped offset reductions in revenue due to Covid, providing 14% of revenues. Income from our endowment fund and from the Sustaining Fund (part of the Campaign for Temple Sinai) provided a total of 3% of revenues.
